

Kutlwano is the creative mind of the group and every song that has been done by the group was selected and rearranged by him. Sibusiso is the group's music director. He is their instrumentalist and keeps them on key.

The group, which has no formal musical training, attributes its recipe for success to shared leadership, dedication and continuous practice. The fact that some of the members of the group are and have also been members of choirs further adds value to the group. "If you need back up vocalists, we are your go to group," said the group, adding, "If you need tom work out a melody for a song you've written, or with shifting



the sound of your choir to a more pop oriented one, or you'd like a group to perform at a function, contact us".

In Harmony's official performance was afforded to them by UNIZULU during one of the University's annual Women Day celebrations event last year (2016). The group scored the gig based on videos posted on their Facebook page.

Through a collaboration, In Harmony performed on SABC's "Imizwilili" a local choral music show that entertains and informs viewers by presenting choral groups in a fresh and exciting way. On 22 June 2017, the group will be recording again for Imizwilili; this time as a singular unit.

The group has done quite a bit of production work for choir oriented music shows and is planning on expanding the field. "There are a few songs that we have written that we wouldn't mind recording as a unit and thereafter releasing. That might happen sooner rather than later," said the group. "On the far end of the spectrum, and right now to be honest, we want to be rich. God willing, we can do this and make a solid living out of it", added the group.

The group is planning on venturing into varying forms of businesses. "We are unstoppable", said the group.



Dr Nonhlanhla Precious Cele

Meet Dr Nonhlanhla Precious Cele (32), an alumna of the University of Zululand who is the Head of Temperature and Humidity Laboratories at the National Metrology Institute of South Africa (NMISA).

Dr Cele obtained her PhD in Physics and Engineering (Material Science); MSc. Physics (Material Science); BSc Hons. Physics (Nuclear physics and Material Science) as well as her BSc. Physics and Electronics from the University of Zululand.

Dr Cele's PhD dissertation was titled: Preparation and Characterization of Nafion based nanocomposite membranes for fuel cell while applications her Master's dissertation titled: Synthesis was and characterization of platinum-carbon nanotube composites.

#Tag caught up with Dr Cele and this is what she had to say.

#Tag: What factors influenced you to choose this career path?

Dr Cele: I have always been interested in how things work and the definition of matter nurtured my interest in science. At first, I thought of having a career in medicine but then I learned

about Newton's laws, which gave me a little understanding of matter and why things work the way they do. I then choose to do Physics to advance my knowledge of matter or material sciences.

#Tag: What kind of education, training, or background does your job require?

Dr Cele: It requires maths and science education, be it a postgraduate degree in Science, Mathematics or Engineering. South Africa does not offer a Metrology qualification at the moment but we are working towards realising that.

#Tag: What do you do? What are the duties/functions/responsibilities of your job?

Dr Cele: The National Metrology Institute South Africa (NMISA) mandated to keep, maintain and disseminate the national measurement standards and units to an international acceptable standard. Our job is to provide the South African industry, environmental, health and safety sectors with fit-for-purpose measurement standards We and measurements. highest maintain the level of accuracy temperature and humidity measurements the country. We calibrate, test, and verify the measuring equipment for the industry. We do research to maintain high level accuracy and develop new measurement standards by participation international in the laboratory comparisons. I am responsible for the day-to-day running the laboratories, strategic planning, business planning, financial and people management.

#Tag: What part of this job do you personally find most satisfying?

Dr Cele: Helping others with the science knowledge and skills I acquired during my career. Then seeing what a difference it makes in their own careers.

#Tag: What is your job description?

Dr Cele: To keep NMISA temperature and humidity section successful. To accomplish this. we use our science skills to help other scientists to increase the quality of their measurements, research and to help the South African industry, environmental, health and safety sectors with fit-for measurements. purpose We assist scientists through our training to enable them to understand and use metrology techniques successfully.

#Tag: What particular skills or talents are most

essential to be effective in your job?

Dr Cele: Innovation as well as ethical practice, independence and the ability to avoid bias, high level of hard science skills, expertise in my field, high level of soft skills at the national and international levels, time management, project management and emotional intelligence.

#Tag: Tell us about your family.

Dr Cele: I am married and I have a son who is 13 years old and two daughters who are aged nine and two.

#Promoting Health Education

HIV/AIDS Awareness at UNIZULU

Tn a bid to advance health Leducation as well as awareness about sexually transmitted infections such as HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis as well as other health and social conditions affecting young people in higher education, the Student Department Services (SSD) at the University of Zululand (UNIZULU) hosted the First Things First campaign.

Held on Monday, 2017, February and Tuesday. 21 February. the campaign; which was held at the KwaDlangezwa and Richard's Bay was organised by a task team from all sections of the University under the SSD banner. The task team collaborated with colleagues from Drama **AIDS** Education (DramAidE); organisation constituted as an outreach program of UNIZULU to facilitate critical awareness transfer skills among under-resourced communities of KwaZulu-Natal.

The First Things First campaign was held at the KwaDlangezwa and Richards Bay campuses and saw the roll-out of various wellness services which culminated in the national launch of the Dialogue on Gender Based Violence that took place on

Friday, 24 February 2017, at the KwaDlangezwa Campus. High profile guests such as Mduduzi Manana, Deputy Minister of Higher Education and Training, and Professor Xoliswa Mtose, UNIZULU Vice-Chancellor attended the dialogue.

The First Things First campaign was designed by the Higher Education and Training HIV/AIDS Programme (HEAIDS) to advance health education and awareness about HIV/ AIDS, STIs, TB and other related health and social conditions affecting the progress of young people in all South African Higher Education institutions. The campaign aims to prevent new infections and

to ensure that those who are infected and affected by the aforementioned conditions receive proper treatment and support as a matter of national priority. In the process, students and staff in are encouraged to get tested and to know their HIV statuses.

HEAIDS, AidsWise, DramAidE, the King Cetshwayo District Health Department, the Foundation Professional Development (FPD). **Broad** Reach, Southern African Clothing Textile Workers' and Union (SACTWU) as well as Van Schaik Bookstore sponsored and partnered on the event.

"The week from the 20th

to the 24th of March stood out as a milestone in the history of the University of Zululand," said Sibusiso Mchunu, the Dean of Students at the University of Zululand. "The Deputy Minister (of Higher Education and Training) made it clear that it was the first successful launch of the Dialogue on Gender Based Violence in the country in a higher education institution. It also set a high benchmark those institutions," said Mchunu. He added. "Besides the strong support and participation students, collaboration by different stakeholders ensured that it (the campaign) became the success that it was.

Student Services The initiated Department and led an outstanding programme, a view that is shared by guests from other institutions as well as the Department of Education and Training. The programme would however have not been that much of a success without the contribution of other stakeholders such as the Communications and Marketing Department, Protective Services Department, Peer Helpers and Physical Planning and Works. The contribution by colleagues from those departments is worth mentioning," he said.
